
Post-War Treatment

In Vietnam

- In Vietnam, Black soldiers experienced the same discrimination as at home
- Received little or no recognition or promotion
- Received harsher punishments than White soldiers
- Often first troops sent into dangerous patrols
- Vietcong were aware of discrimination



The Draft


- Upper administration of many draft boards were members of Ku Klux Klan
- Rumor began going around that the draft and the conflict
- Celebrities began to speak out against the war
- Rise of organizations like the Black Panthers
- Embracing African heritage







- Successfully reached popular audiences
- Not popular with traditional jazz audiences
